

BELIEVING IN PEOPLE IS BELIEVING IN BRAZIL

Brazil is enormous. It is vast in its territory, diverse in its people, plural in its ideas, and — as would be expected — enormously complex in its challenges. We currently occupy the 57th position in the Programme for International Student Assessment global rankings, which puts our children's educational performance in the bottom third. Incredibly, fully half of Brazil's public school students are still illiterate by third grade. Brazil suffers from a bona fide learning crisis. But Brazil's problems go beyond education. While we have one of the highest GDPs, we are at the same time the seventh most unequal country in the world (UNDP). In fact, we are the only nation that finds ourselves on the Top 10 list for both GDP and income inequality. Almost half of all Brazilians don't have access to basic sanitation. More than 12 percent of the working-age population, 12 million people in all, are unemployed and informal









employment rates have reached an all-time high (IBGE). In the face of these dispiriting realities, the Lemann Foundation has remained unflaggingly committed to making Brazil fairer, more inclusive, and more developed. We invest in the country's most powerful resource: people. To advance Brazil's development with equity we must do nothing less than unlock the potential of its children and future leaders by ensuring a high-quality public school education and empowering social changemakers committed to a more just and equal Brazil. Our strategy focuses on helping build the large-scale, systemic initiatives that enable coherent education policies and foster collaboration between leaders, school managers and teachers who together set high expectations for all students. We closed out 2019 working hand-in-hand with 50 municipal and state education departments, having provided them with technical support, training programs, curriculum development, and instructional policies. We have already







helped enhance the education and lives of almost <u>2 million</u>

<u>students</u> with our cost-effective, multi-year partnerships.

Reversing inequality at scale also demands unleashing the power of the current generation of rising leaders <u>dedicated to</u>

<u>social transformation in Brazil</u>. The nation's many challenges require the engagement of <u>courageous</u>, <u>well-prepared leaders</u>.

The Foundation is working to provide a critical mass of changemakers with the resources they need to make Brazil a more just and equal place. In total, the Foundation has supported more than 700 Brazilians, including seven who have been elected to national and state office and more than 100 who now work in federal or local government. This, in addition to a whole legion of social entrepreneurs, public managers, third-sector leaders, and researchers dedicated to providing the knowledge that can be put to use to make Brazil a better place for everyone. We are committed to helping every person in Brazil achieve their potential, inclusive of religion, ideology, race, gender,

It is in this collaborative spirit, the Lemann Foundation forges forward into 2020 working alongside 125 institutional partners, eight international universities, five Foundation-funded national and international research centers, as well as dozens of education departments across all 26 states. Through this collaboration, and with the dedication of a diverse network of leaders, we are making a difference. In 2020, we will accomplish even more. Because we are convinced that when Brazilians reach their full potential, so will Brazil.

Institute, technical partners, and 50
education departments around the
country. These 1.8 million students
learn from thousands of passionate
teachers and managers whose work
we also support.

Garofalo's project, which transforms
trash into robots, reaching a total of 2.5

our leadership networks, including the **Lemann Fellowship**, Talentos da Educação, Talentos da Saúde, Líderes Públicos, Conectando Saberes, Brazilian Creative Learning Network, Ponte de Talentos, and Terceiro Setor Transforma. Through these networks, educators and other leaders who've historically been isolated from one another can share ideas, solutions, and innovations. They are pushing boundaries in the fields of education, healthcare, public safety, academia, entrepreneurship, public management, climate and sustainability. They hail from all over the country – from crowded cities to sleepy towns, from abundant rainforests to dry grasslands, from sprawling wetlands to vast coastline. Julia Sant'Anna, a member of Talentos da Educação went to London to study Globalization and Development in Latin America and holds a Ph.D. in Political Science. As a public servant, she formulated structural policies aimed at helping schools function more effectively. At Rio de Janeiro's Education Department, she helped the state rise from second-to-last on the Basic Education Development Index to fourth best in the country. Now she is the Secretary of Education of Minas Gerais, one of Brazil's largest public education districts. In her first year on the job, the rate of high schoolers reading below grade level decreased markedly.

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Isabela Vallejo, a member of the Talentos da Saúde program, improved logistics for the National Health System. She says being part of such a diverse network helps to achieve her vision to improve the quality of everyday healthcare: "The network inspires you and removes obstacles. It gives you that extra nudge that you needed." Changing the lives of massive numbers of people is never a simple undertaking. Transforming the entire structure of a system is an even greater challenge. However, it it is imperative if we are to ensure all Brazilians have a fair shot at developing their skills and competencies to the fullest. That is why we are proud to have contributed to the continued progress of the **National Learning Standards** in 2019. The Standards have been a heated topic of discussion in Brazil since 2015. The legislation survived several administrations to become the official public policy defining what students have the right to learn. We worked with a wide group of stakeholders to align state curricula with the Standards. These groups included the **National Council of Education Secretaries** (Consed), the Union of Municipal Education Managers (Undime), the Ministry of Education (MEC), the Movement for the Standards, as well as educators and various experts. In 2020, all 40 million public school students will be required to follow the Standards. The Foundation will continue to assist.

We have learned a great deal from the


varying local contexts and created partnerships to advance this agenda in the public sphere. With the help of

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the Brava Foundation, the Humanize Institute, and República.org, we work with the states of Ceará, Minas Gerais, Pará, Paraná, Pernambuco, Rio Grande do Sul, São Paulo, and Sergipe. More than 600 leaders have now been hired to occupy positions in healthcare, education, security, and planning based on objective assessments of their skills and experience. Hiring qualified people for the public sector will go a long way to solving our country's social challenges. We have started to make real headway in building a public sector that more fairly and efficiently distributes the nation's precious and limited resources. We are investing in Jean's future, in Ana's vision, and in aspiring leaders all over the country. Over the next few pages, you will hear more about our programs for public education, for people development, and for setting up Brazil to triumph over its many social challenges.

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

APRENDIZAGEM CRIATIVA

The Brazilian Creative
Learning Network was
founded in 2015 by 20
educators who were selected
in the "Makers Educa" project,
promoted by the Lemann
Foundation and the MIT
Media Lab. The group now
has over 3,000 educators and
educational managers from
all over Brazil. They advocate
for a more hands-on learning
model, driven by interactive
methodologies, creativity, and



CONECTANDO SABERES

A network of educators who build collective spaces for engaging each other and sharing practices. There are already more than 60 groups active in all states, coordinated by public school teachers and supported by the Lemann Foundation.

Together, they debate educational policies, share best practices and, in 2019, they extended their reach by establishing partnerships with local education departments



EDUCAÇÃO CONECTADA

This initiative by the Brazilian Social and Economic

Development Bank put forth a strategic vision for the instructional use of support of Itaú Social and the Lemann Foundation, technical support from the Center for Innovation in the Brazilian Education, and guidance from the Ministry of Education's management committee, the project is already live in six state school districts and 11 municipal school districts. reaching 168,000 students. The goal is to improve literacy and numeracy rates, in addition to bolstering student



EDUCAR PRA VALER

This initiative by the Bem Comum Association is supported by the Lemann Foundation and offers free technical advice to municipalities, supporting them in the implementation of good management practices.



FORMAR

This partnership between the Lemann Foundation and public education departments all over Brazil promotes and aligns the efforts of education departments and schools. It does this by bringing stakeholders closer, supporting educators in their professional development, and improving management practices and instructional processes. Currently, Formar

supports the learning of over 1 million students in 25 public school districts.



PARCERIA PELA ALFABETIZAÇÃO

Together with the Bem
Comum Association and the
Natura Institute, we created
the Collaborative Partnership
for Literacy. The program is
modeled after the extraordinary
successes in the city of Sobral
and the Age-Appropriate Literacy
Program in the state of Ceará. The
Partnership supports several state
governments to foster literacy
acquisition at the right age, with
an emphasis on the Portuguese
language and Mathematics. We
have already partnered with five
states contributing to the literacy
development of more than
600,000 students.



PESSOAS NO SETOR PÚBLICO

Our alliance with the Brava Foundation, the Humanize org promotes People Management in the Public Sector. The initiative is the result of a partnership with state governments. It works system for public sector leadership positions that are filled by appointment of the governor or other decisionmakers. The program includes processes for attracting and pre-selecting candidates and the implementation of a performance-driven, development-based culture.

TOGETHER WE CAN DO MUCH MORE FOR OUR COUNTRY

Finding solutions to complex problems requires both the exchange of ideas and fruitful partnerships. Quality education, better public services, and true social advancement can only become a reality if we work closely across different sectors, combining our visions and knowledge. Here are examples of our collaborative work that is already bringing about real social change.

MINAS GERAIS

The second most populous state, famed for its colonial-era towns dating to the country's 18th-century gold rush, has been with us since 2015. Together, we have embarked on several successful innovations from creative learning to the pre-selection of leaders in the public sector.

WE DID IT TOGETHER!

Pessoas no Setor Público - We contribute to the Transforma Minas state program, which seeks to professionalize the selection process to fill public management positions. In 2019, over 6,000 candidates applied for positions and 121 were selected through newly implemented objective and rigorous standards.

Aprendizagem Criativa - The Brazilian

Creative Learning Network supported 64 children with learning difficulties and trained 100 teachers in São João Del-Rei. The

Network's Robotics project in Belo Horizonte

enhancing students' computational thinking has won worldwide acclaim.

Conectando Saberes - The network has been in Belo Horizonte since 2015. It has now expanded to reach teachers in the neighboring cities of Leopoldina and Santo Antônio do Monte. It offers teacher training and discussions on classroom practices to educators living in the region.

Eighty-four percent of the students in Pernambuco state go to municipal schools. Located on the northeast coast, the state was the only one in the country to reach the progress goal outlined in the Brazilian Ministry of Education's Index of Development of Basic Education (IDEB). We assisted in teacher training and public management initiatives in the state.

WE DID IT TOGETHER!

Pessoas no Setor Público - We support the state in the Vem pro Time program, which created selection processes for leadership positions in the departments of Education and Sports, Planning and Management, and Administration.

Parceria pela Alfabetização - We support the state in the Criança Alfabetizada literacy program, reaching more than 3,800 schools, 19,000 teachers, and 330,000 children. Formar - We work with the Pernambuco state school district and also the municipal school districts of Recife, Caruaru, and Cabo de Santo Agostinho. In total, we provide support to over 147,000 students in the state.

Educar pra Valer - Garanhuns, Igarassu,
Olinda, Paulista, and Serra Talhada are the
municipalities in Pernambuco that work with
us. Since the program started, we have already
seen an increase in the number of readers in
those regions.

Conectando Saberes - The first group was created in 2015 in the city of Itambé and was led by Professor Jayse Antônio, who was named by the Global Teacher Prize as one of the top 50 teachers in the world. In 2018, another municipality, Caruaru, joined in and in 2019, more groups were formed in Recife, Paulista, and Petrolina.

RIO GRANDE DO SUL

We have been working with Brazil's southernmost state for two years, expanding partnerships to foster learning and assisting the government in delineating the qualifications for public servants.

WE DID IT TOGETHER!

Pessoas no Setor Público - Thirty candidates were selected to fill regional coordinator positions in the State Education Department through Qualifica RS, a skill-based preselection program led by the state and supported by us.

Educação Conectada - Reaching over 28,000 students in 76 schools in Cachoeira do Sul and Santa Maria, the program leverages technology to facilitate learning and promote the continuing education of teachers.

Educar pra Valer - Cachoeira do Sul was one of the first municipalities to participate in the program. Novo Hamburgo joined in later. Both cities saw improvements in the performance of second- and fifth-grade students in reading assessments in 2019.

Conectando Saberes - These groups are thriving in Porto Alegre, Novo Hamburgo, São Gabriel, and Pelotas. In 2019, at the Connecting Good Practices Seminar, São Gabriel teacher Aliane Alves received an award for an environmental project carried out with 5-year-old students.

Aprendizagem Criativa - Students and teachers from Pelotas participate in the Brazilian Creative Learning Network through the Creative Computing Clubs focused on Culture, Art, Technology, and Innovation.

SERGIPE

We have been working with Sergipe, located on the northeast coast, since 2016. The state's public school system was one of the first to join the Formar program. We have since learned a great deal together and achieved major social improvements in the state.

WE DID IT TOGETHER!

Parceria pela Alfabetização - In total, 86,000 public school children will be impacted by Alfabetizar pra Valer, a government initiative that we support to help children learn how to read and write at the right age.

Formar - We have been promoting training programs together since 2016, such as Management for Learning (together with Elos Educacional, an organization that supports the development of education leaders). In another training program, specific Teaching Strategies for Mathematics, we work with Mathema, an institution that develops mathematics pedagogies. We have also partnered with the education department to shape instruction policies for all the districts' schools.

Pessoas no Setor Público - We assisted in

the state's the selection process of 10 Regional Teaching
Coordinators for the public school district. The initiative inspired a similar pre-selection process for the principals of the state schools.

Conectando Saberes – The group in Lagarto is coordinated by educator Tirzah d'Avila who organizes activities prioritizing reading

proficiency and socio-emotional skills.

Educação Conectada - 100 percent of state schools in Sergipe and 50 percent of schools in the municipality of Lagarto are members of the Educação Conectada program. In Lagarto, the focus is on reading proficiency and socio-emotional skills.

AROUND THE WORLD

We support eight international universities that are world centers of knowledge. They are Columbia, Harvard, Illinois, Oxford, MIT, Stanford, University of Southern California, and St. Gallen in Switzerland. Almost 500 scholarships for Brazilian students have been granted since the partnership started.

We promoted and participated in dozens of conferences and events on education, social impact, and the public sector in Brazil and internationally. The gatherings were held by partner organizations and universities and by the leaders of our networks.

We provide funding to five research and knowledge-production centers devoted to solving Brazil's social problems. The centers provide opportunities for professors and students to do good works in Brazil and raise the visibility of our country in some of the world's top universities.



RIGHT TO QUALITY HEALTHCARE

Born the daughter of university professors, Camila Lajolo went on to become an alumna of the Medical School of the State University of Campinas and served a residency in Hematology, the branch of medicine concerned with blood and its diseases. Dr. Lajolo then did an MBA in Health Economics and Management and received a Master's in Public Health from Harvard, where she joined the Lemann Fellows network. At the beginning of her career, Calima worked in accreditation in charge of the quality assurance certifications of dozens of blood banks, laboratories, and hospitals in Brazil, both private and public. Camila oversaw Santa Casa Hospitals in the State of Minas Gerais and renowned hospitals in São Paulo. At the Santa Catarina Hospital, she led a project that reduced hospital infections by at least 1,000 cases. She is also part of the Quality of Care and Patient Safety initiative of the National Council of Health Secretaries. She attended the World Health Organization in Geneva to collaborate with the emergency program, which broadened her strategic vision and boosted her impact when she returned. In 2019, in partnership with the International Red Cross, Camila developed strategies to improve the organization's response to natural disasters and humanitarian emergencies.

MAY INEQUALITY IN THE FAVELAS BECOME HISTORY

Edu Lyra is a restless young man. He was born in a favela in the city of Guarulhos 31 years ago. He grew up in a humble shanty in a neighborhood with no school, daycare service, or basic sanitation. His mother, Maria Gorete, was the North Star guiding him in his perilous journey. She would always tell him: "Son, it doesn't matter where you come from; what matters is where you are going." It was his mother's words, faith, and inspiration that changed the course of Edu's life. He went on to become the founder of the NGO Gerando Falcões, an initiative the Lemann Foundation is proud to co-fund. The NGO works in ghettos and favelas to foster culture, sports, and professional training to drive income generation for families.

(My dream is for inequality in the favelas to become history. I want to reach every favela in Brazil. Today, there are almost 7,000 favelas with 14 million people living in these areas of poverty without basic sanitation, water, schools, daycare services, quality education. For this dream to come true, we need leaders. The change will only happen if we have empowered leaders, support, and assistance. There is a revolution starting in the favelas and it will get bigger and bigger with the impact of the leaders that we empower.) A LIFE LIVED FOR EDUCATION





Katia Smole's name is well-known in the fields of pedagogy and education policy. From an early age, education was central to her life and when the time came to choose a career, there was no question she would become an educator. Today, she holds a Doctorate in Education with a concentration in Science and Mathematics instruction from the University of São Paulo's School of Education. She was Secretary of Basic Education at the Ministry of Education and now leads Mathema, an institution that develops mathematics pedagogical methods and conducts training in our Formar program. In 2019, she took on a new challenge – founding and directing the Reúna Institute, an organization created through investments by the Lemann Foundation and Imaginable Futures. Reúna develops knowledge and technical-pedagogical services that foster a more coherent educational system. The organization produces content and tools that help educational managers put the National Learning Standards into practice.

INCLUSION FOR ALL RACES AND SOCIAL CLASSES



Selma Moreira's family always encouraged hard work and self-confidence to overcome life's obstacles. While still in high school, she became a packer at a supermarket chain. Thirteen years passed and the humble packer of grocery bags moved up the corporate ladder to become the company's social responsibility manager. She later learned about Baobá, a fund for racial equity, just as she was in the process of discovering and appreciating her own blackness. She went on to become the director of Baobá, where she combined her struggle for a fairer world with her professional expertise. In 2019, the Lemann Foundation and W.K. Kellogg established a partnership with Baobá, investing in scholarships for black students to enter graduate programs in healthcare, education, and public management at Lemann's partner universities of Harvard, Columbia, Stanford, MIT, Illinois, and Oxford.

(My purpose is to contribute to a more equitable and inclusive Brazil. I believe that all black people should be in the spaces of action and power developing their potential to the fullest. And it is a challenge considering the legacy of racism that the colonial times left behind. The black population still faces obstacles in education and labor. I want to break down those barriers.
